Sunday 26th December 2021 St Stephen's Day

Today we celebrate St Stephen's Day. Stephen was the most well-known of the seven Deacons recruited by the 12 Apostles to help with the care of the poor, the widows and orphans. However, he was also a good preacher and it was his preaching which got him into trouble with the enemies of the Church, resulting in them stoning him to death. The church in her wisdom follows the joyful celebration of Christ's birth with the feast day of the first Christian Martyr.

In fact, this week we also have the Murder of the Holy Innocents on Tuesday and St. Thomas Becket who was also murdered on Wednesday. So, this first week of Christmas has a bittersweet mood to it and perhaps a reminder that being a Christian, following Christ is not an easy option. As Stephen died, he imitated Jesus on the cross saying:

"Lord, lay not this sin to their charge."

There are many aspects of Stephen's life which parallel Jesus, as he sought to follow Jesus closely.

The Church gives us this reminder that the Christian life is not just the joy of Christmas morning, but the challenge of suffering throughout our daily lives. We rejoice over the salvation freely offered by the baby in the manger, but the reality is. **He calls us to "pick up our cross" and follow Him.**

Central to that calling is the care for the poor and destitute. In times gone by Boxing day was when the poor were given Christmas Boxes. In the time when the landed gentry and rich had many house staff. Boxing Day was their day off and they were often sent home with the left over food from Christmas day. In churches the Christmas collections were distributed on Boxing Day. It's where the notion of alms giving comes from. When we all lived in villages it would have been easier to identify the poor as they were part of the community. Today life is very different, we are much more aware of the poverty and suffering in our world beyond our local community. We recognise the need to help the poor all year not just at Christmas. As we celebrate God's gift to us this Christmas, let us not forget our calling to give to the poor and needy in our world.

First Reading: Acts 7.51-end

Stephen said to the high priest and the council: 'You stiff-necked people, uncircumcised in heart and ears, you are for ever opposing the Holy Spirit, just as your ancestors used to do. Which of the prophets did your ancestors not persecute? They killed those who foretold the coming of the Righteous One, and now you have become his betrayers and murderers. You are the ones that received the law as ordained by angels, and yet you have not kept it.'

When they heard these things, they became enraged and ground their teeth at Stephen. Stephen, filled with the Holy Spirit, gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. 'Look,' he said, 'I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!' But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.' Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them.' When he had said this, he died.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 10.17-22

Jesus summoned the twelve and sent them out with the following instruction: 'Beware of them, for they will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues; and you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them and the Gentiles. When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say; for what you are to say will be given to you at that time; for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you. Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death; and you will be hated by all because of my name. But the one who endures to the end will be saved.
