Sunday 30th January 2022 Candlemas

This Sunday marks the feast of Candlemas. It's the turning point between Christmas and Easter, as we hear the story of the child Jesus presented in the Temple and two strangers recognise in him the light of God. We leave behind our Christmas celebrations as the young Jesus is dedicated as 'holy to the Lord', and we turn towards the cross with a foreshadowing of what's to come as Mary is told he will be 'a sign that will be opposed...and a sword will pierce your own heart too.' So, on this feast, we stand between Christmas and Easter, between Christ's birth and his death, and perhaps are given a chance to reflect on the whole span of the life of faith.

And as we do, Simeon and Anna offer us a picture of a faithful life that is drawing to its close. They show us lives that have been lived in faithful attentiveness to the workings of God, lives open to the leading and revealing of the Spirit. Though they finally see and recognise Jesus toward the end of their lives, every act of faithfulness that came before had prepared them for that moment. So perhaps we're given the opportunity to reflect on how our own faith has changed and grown and deepened over the years. And perhaps we're given a chance to prepare to know God in still new and unexpected ways as we say with Simeon (as the prayer book has it):

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace: according to thy word.

For mine eyes have seen:

thy salvation;

Which thou hast prepared: before the face of all people;

To be a light to lighten the Gentiles: and to be the glory of thy people Israel

First Reading: Malachi 3.1-5

Thus says the Lord God: See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight – indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts.



But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

Then I will draw near to you for judgement; I will be swift to bear witness against the sorcerers, against the adulterers, against those who swear falsely, against those who oppress the hired workers in their wages, the widow, and the orphan, against those who thrust aside the alien, and do not fear me, says the LORD of hosts.

Gospel: Luke 2.22-40

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.' Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word;

for my eyes have seen your salvation,

which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

a light for revelation to the Gentiles

and for glory to your people Israel.'

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed – and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.
