Sunday 13th February 2022 Third Sunday before Lent

This is the 3rd Sunday before Lent, the first of those three Sundays which traditionally carried long names: Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima. Today then is Septuagesima, the 9th Sunday before Easter. In the Eastern church it is known as the "Sunday of the Prodigal" because their Gospel reading is Luke 15.

Our readings, however, have a different theme; that of being "happy" or "blessed" on the one hand, or "woeful" on the other! This leads us to ask where real happiness can be found amidst all the vicissitudes and changing scenes of life.

As the gospel we hear Luke's version of the Beatitudes. These largely correspond with Matthew's account, but there are differences. His setting is on the plain not on the mountain, and while Matthew records only "blessings", Luke includes a number of "woes" directed largely at the rich, the well fed, and the merry!

Another difference which may be significant, is that Luke does not attempt to "spiritualise" the blessings as Matthew does. So in Luke the poor remain simply the poor, not the "poor in spirit", and the hungry remain the hungry, rather than those hungering after righteousness. This may well reflect Luke's compassion and concern for justice, a theme that runs through his gospel. In the synagogue at Nazareth Luke shows Jesus setting the tone very clearly: "He has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor, freedom for the prisoners, sight for the blind, freedom for the oppressed".

The Old Testament reading from Jeremiah contrasts the happy state of the man who trusts in God compared to one who puts his trust in mankind. This latter person is like a tree growing in wasteland, in the parched places of the desert, where no one lives, which will never prosper. By contrast, the one who trusts in the Lord is like a tree planted by a stream, its leaves are always green, it doesn't fear the drought, it never fails to bear fruit. Psalm 1 (the appointed psalm for this Sunday) uses the same kind of imagery.

In the Epistle passage from 1st Corinthians chapter 15 Paul reminds us that the true bedrock of our faith lies in the fact that Christ has indeed been raised from the dead: if this were not so, all our faith and hopes would be in vain.

First Reading: Jeremiah 17.5-10 Thus says the LORD:

Cursed are those who trust in mere mortals

and make mere flesh their strength,

whose hearts turn away from the LORD.

They shall be like a shrub in the desert,

and shall not see when relief comes.

They shall live in the parched places of the wilderness,

in an uninhabited salt land.

Blessed are those who trust in the LORD,

whose trust is the LORD.

They shall be like a tree planted by water,

sending out its roots by the stream.

It shall not fear when heat comes,

and its leaves shall stay green;

in the year of drought it is not anxious,

and it does not cease to bear fruit.

The heart is devious above all else;

it is perverse -

who can understand it?

I the LORD test the mind

and search the heart,

to give to all according to their ways,

according to the fruit of their doings.

Gospel Reading: Luke 6.17-26

He came down with them and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them.

Then he looked up at his disciples and said:

'Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God.

'Blessed are you who are hungry now,

for you will be filled.

'Blessed are you who weep now,

for you will laugh.

'Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice on that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

'But woe to you who are rich,

for you have received your consolation.

'Woe to you who are full now,

for you will be hungry.

'Woe to you who are laughing now,

for you will mourn and weep.

'Woe to you when all speak well of you, for that is what their ancestors did to the false prophets.
