Sunday 20th March 2022 Third Sunday of Lent

What on earth did they do to deserve this? That might be the question that goes through your mind when you hear the news sometimes. Perhaps when you heard of the destruction of more than one hospital full of sick patients or women in labour, or the bombing of a theatre sheltering children and older people. The answer of course is 'nothing'. They just got in the way of representatives of a violent immoral regime. But sometimes terrible accidents happen – on the roads, on building sites – innocent people die or are seriously injured – and we ask ourselves the same question.

Behind the question is a view of God as controlling events in our world, and meting out punishment to sinners. A somewhat medieval view, informed by the way that rulers of that period dispensed justice.

But in today's gospel, Jesus puts forward a different perspective. Pilate incurred the enmity of Jews in Roman-occupied Palestine by ignoring their religious traditions and culture, and promoting Roman deities and traditions. Here Jesus refers to an atrocity committed by Pilate's over zealous troops, in which Galilean Jews (looked down on by Jerusalem Jews) were killed in the Jerusalem temple while making a sacrifice to God. Jesus reminds them about a seemingly random event of fellow Jerusalem Jews dying in a tower collapse. If it was true that the Galileans who died had it coming, do they think it is true that the ones who died when Siloam fell also deserved it?

Judging whether someone else is sinful enough for their experience of suffering to be justified misses the whole point. We are all sinners – all caught up in what the prayer book calls 'the changes and chances of this mortal life'. The less repentance of sin there is, the more dangerous the world becomes. The less repentance of sin there is, the more self-inflicted suffering occurs. The more time we spend judging when we look at the suffering of others, the less time we spend actually loving, becoming responsible, and doing something about it. We cannot indefinitely live in a way that bears no fruit, and expect to evade God's judgement. Nevertheless, the gardener is there for us: we have a loving God who is unbelievably patient and is willing to encourage us and strengthen our faith. Lent is an appropriate time to try to grow in faith and fruitfulness.

Eternal God,
give us insight
to discern your will for us,
to give up what harms us,
and to seek the perfection we are promised
in Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading: Isaiah 55.1-9

The LORD says this: Everyone who thirsts, come to the waters: and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labour for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food. Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live. I will make with you an everlasting covenant, my steadfast, sure love for David. See, I made him a witness to the peoples, a leader and commander for the peoples. See, you shall call nations that you do not know, and nations that do not know you shall run to you, because of the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, for he has glorified you. Seek the LORD while he may be found, call upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake their way. and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the LORD, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the LORD. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

Gospel Reading: Luke 13.1-9

There were some present who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, 'Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them -do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did.' Then he told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, "See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?" He replied, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down."
