Sunday 29th May 2022 Seventh Sunday of Easter

This morning we're in the middle of the nine days of prayer between Ascension and Pentecost. It's a time of prayerful waiting for the coming of the Holy Spirit, and a time to pray particularly for the mission of the church. Globally a movement called Thy Kingdom Come has called churches around the world to set this time apart to do just that, and I think this morning's reading from Acts offers an opportunity to reflect on that call.

And what strikes me in this morning's passage is that prayer supports us, prayer sets us free, and prayer speaks of God's grace. So, first prayer supports us. Paul and Silas find themselves stripped, flogged, and thrown into the innermost cell of the prison. Then we're told that at midnight they were praying and singing hymns to God. In the darkest point of the night, in the darkest cell in the prison, their feet chained their backs bleeding, they pray. Their reflex in need, is to pray. Their response in trouble is to praise the God they know as their rock and their refuge. Perhaps, whether we face bad times or good, we too can learn to respond with prayer. Whatever we face, before anything else, we can learn to turn to the God who is our support.

And then, prayer sets us free. Because as they pray, an earthquake shakes the cell, their chains fall off, and the doors fly open. So, prayer sets us free, it breaks the chains that bind and hold us, and offers, as Paul would later put it in his letter to the Romans, 'the glorious liberty of the children of God.' The workings of prayer are a mystery, but it seems that it's most often through prayer that God chooses to act. It's through prayer that God breaks the chains that hold us in darkness, and allows us to emerge into his light. Whether our chains are physical, spiritual or mental, it's so often in prayer that God is at work to set us free.

And finally, prayer speaks of God's grace. In a striking moment, as the jailer sees his life falling apart, imagining the prisoners escaped, and is about to fall on his sword, Paul reassures him, and the jailer asks: 'Sirs, what must I do to be saved?' The obedient and prayerful response of Paul and Silas, as they choose not to put themselves first, but to remain where they are amazes this man, who recognises God's hand at work. Perhaps similarly, our prayerful lives, as they reflect obedience to God can speak of God's grace. Our faithful prayer bears witness to a faithful God, and perhaps from time to time, others will see it, and ask us the same question: 'what must I do to be saved?'.

Acts 16.16-34

One day, as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a slave-girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortunetelling. While she followed Paul and us, she would cry out, 'These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you a way of salvation.' She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, 'I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her.' And it came out that very hour.

But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the market-place before the authorities. When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, 'These men are disturbing our city; they are Jews and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt or observe.' The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing and ordered them to be beaten with rods. After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was an earthquake, so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. But Paul shouted in a loud voice, 'Do not harm yourself, for we are all here.' The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. Then he brought them outside and said, 'Sirs, what must I do to be saved?' They answered, 'Believe on the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household.' They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. He brought them up into the house and set food before them; and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God.

John 17.20-26

Jesus looked up to heaven and prayed: 'Holy Father, I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me. Father, I desire that those also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory, which you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world.

'Righteous Father, the world does not know you, but I know you; and these know that you have sent me. I made your name known to them, and I will make it known, so that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them.'
