

Team Parish of Christ the King St Aidan's, Brunton Park

Sunday 8th May 2022 Fourth Sunday of Easter

This morning's reading from Acts asks us, I think, to consider our calling to do what Jesus did. Peter arrives in Joppa, and there he finds a scene of grief and distress as a woman has died. But rather than join with the mourners, Peter prays that she might 'rise up'. And Tabitha does!

The parallels between this healing and both Jesus' raising of Jairus' daughter, and his own resurrection are striking. The messengers sent; the sending away of mourners; the words spoken, 'Tabitha, get up,' echoing 'little girl, arise'; the taking by the hand; all these closely follow the pattern of Jesus' miracle as he raises a young girl from death. Equally the language used, *anastethi* 'arise', and as Peter 'showed her to be alive' are the very words used of Jesus' resurrection.

What we're supposed to hear is that Peter, though he is not Jesus, continues his work in his power. So, first Peter does what Jesus did, performing the same miracles, even to the point of raising the dead. And that same calling continues. We too, as the church, are called to do what Jesus did. We are called to offer healing in his name, and to proclaim new life out of death. We are called, as Peter will later say of Jesus, to 'go about doing good.' We are called to continue the witness to God's grace and life and love that was Jesus' ministry on earth. We are called to do what Jesus did.

And we can do that, precisely because of Jesus' resurrection. Peter speaks the language of resurrection, and with it comes new life. Not because he is Jesus, but because his continues Jesus' work in Jesus' power. And that power is the power of resurrection.

And, again, we do the same. The church can only do what Jesus did because of his resurrection. We can only continue his ministry of grace, because the power of his risen life continues among us. We can only live as witnesses to new life because that new life resides within us. We are called to do what Jesus did, because Christ is risen, and the power of his resurrection has taken root in our hearts and lives.

First Reading: Acts 9.36-43

In Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, 'Please come to us without delay.' So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, 'Tabitha, get up.' Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

Gospel Reading: John 10.22-30

At that time the festival of the Dedication took place in Jerusalem. It was winter, and Jesus was walking in the temple, in the portico of Solomon. So the Jews gathered around him and said to him, 'How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are the Messiah, tell us plainly.' Jesus answered, 'I have told you, and you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name testify to me; but you do not believe, because you do not belong to my sheep. My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand. What my Father has given me is greater than all else, and no one can snatch it out of the Father's hand. The Father and I are one.'
