# Sunday 19th June 2022

# 1st Sunday After Trinity

Our gospel reading of the healing of the demoniac is found in the first three Gospels of which todays reading from Luke's Gospel gives the most detailed. It is an account which gives much to ponder. All 3 Gospels tell of a violent storm as they crossed the Lake, so fierce that Jesus's companions feared they would all drown. Jesus calmed the storm, called them to faith and left them in great awe that he could command the wind and the waves to obey him.

Having landed safely they were immediately confronted by this very frightening, mentally distressed man, so violent that the towns people had cast him out to live among the tombs. We might say that having faced nature's aggressive power on the lake, Jesus and his companions were then faced with what today we would say was a mentally storm ridden man. But, just as in the boat Jesus addressed the storm, without asking any questions of the man, he immediately began to heal him. The man is described as demon possessed. Demon possession was seen as the cause of disturbing behaviour and attempts to cure people were aimed to rid the demons, to send them into the eternal abyss where they would find eternal punishment. It is not surprising the that the man initially shouted out for Jesus not to torment him [v.31]

Jesus then asked the man for his name [v.30]. For Jesus this was not just a nameless sick man, but an individual in his own full right to be recognised as such – a vital principle of good practice for those in the medical and caring professions, but also for any of us who care for those in need. Unfortunately, such was the depth of his illness, all he could say was `legion, for many demons had entered him.' As in Old Testament times, then so today to you and me, He calls us by name. `I have called you by name; you are mine.' And God's promise is that will be with us through whatever storms we face [Isaiah 43. 1-2], [Psalm 23.4].

Then we read of the demons leaving the man, entering a herd of pigs who rushed headlong to their deaths in the lake. Not sure what we make of that. More significant for Luke's readers is that when the towns people came out to see what was happening, they found the man sitting quietly with Jesus, naked no more but `clothed and in his right mind.' [v.35] In our epistle reading St Paul uses the image of being clothed in Christ and being clothed in Christ brings a wholeness of being which spans all human

differences, of gender, of status and nationality and into the divine family of God. [Galatians 27-29]

So yet again we read of Jesus bringing the sick and distressed to wholeness as they reached out to him.

A final thought: the man wished to go with Jesus, but he directed him to return to his home community to witness to Christ's grace. Some may feel called to leave home areas to serve Christ, but for most of us, as we are clothed with Christ, we are called to witness to God's healing love just where we are, in our home communities, our family circles, neighbourhoods, work places, schools, our daily settings.

## First Reading: Galatians 3:23-end

Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. Therefore, the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be reckoned as righteous by faith. But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian, for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek; there is no longer slave or free; there is no longer male and female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring heirs according to the promise.

### Luke 8:28-39

When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, 'What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me'— for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) Jesus then asked him, 'What is your name?' He said, 'Legion'; for many demons had entered him. They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss. Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned. When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So, he got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, 'Return to your home, and declare how much

God has done for you.' So, he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.
