**Sunday 3rd July 2022
Thomas the Apostle**

Today we're marking the feast of Thomas the Apostle, a disciple whose legacy has been this moment of doubt that we read in today's Gospel. The phrase, 'a doubting Thomas', has passed into our language. So whatever else he was, his legacy is an encounter with Jesus that is a move from doubt to faith, and I think it's an important one as we consider our own journey of doubt and faith.

So, first of all, Thomas doubts. He can't believe that Jesus has risen, unless he sees the proof: sees the marks in his hands, touches his side. And it's worth recognising that his doubt is entirely reasonable. Dead people don't come back to life as a rule. If someone tells you they did, wanting some proof is no bad thing! It's also worth recognising that our own faith will be entwined with doubt, and in search of proof to hang it on, and that too is no bad thing.

We will have our doubts about the truth of an ancient story that can seem hard to believe. Doubts about the power of a good God in a world filled with suffering. Doubts about the experience of prayer or the encounter with God. Doubts about whether the whole thing can hold up to scrutiny. But rather than lament the fact, perhaps we might celebrate that doubt is exactly what deepens and enriches our faith. It's what keeps us searching and questioning, and learning. Doubt is what keeps our faith from encrusting into a static crust of false certainty and instead allows it to evolve as we do. Doubt is what makes our faith robust enough to last, instead of the brittle shell of an unquestioned and unquestioning faith that crumbles and falls when cracks begin to appear.

But it's also worth noticing what happens as Jesus appears. He offers what Thomas needs to believe, and Thomas responds, 'My Lord and my God.' The faith he discovers isn't one of intellectual assent to a proposition, but of relationship and encounter with the living God. So as our doubts and questions lead us onward in faith, perhaps we also need to ask what relationship of trust, what encounter with the living God, undergirds, and supports our faith. There will be as many stories of faith as there are people. So, what draws you back to keep searching for more of God? What – who – is it that you have discovered that keeps you turning back to this faithful relationship? Thomas found his answer as he saw the risen Christ, how do you find yourself saying: 'My Lord and my God.'?

Reading: Habakkuk 2.1-4

I will stand at my watch-post,
and station myself on the rampart;
I will keep watch to see what he will say to me,
and what he will answer concerning my complaint.
Then the LORD answered me and said:
Write the vision;
make it plain on tablets,
so that a runner may read it.
For there is still a vision for the appointed time;
it speaks of the end, and does not lie.
If it seems to tarry, wait for it;
it will surely come, it will not delay.
Look at the proud!
Their spirit is not right in them,
but the righteous live by their faith.

Gospel: John 20.24-29

Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.' A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe.' Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.'
