

# Team Parish of Christ the King St Aidan's, Brunton Park

Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> August 2022 Transfiguration Sunday

This morning celebrates the feast of the Transfiguration. It's a moment of revelation as Jesus shines with all the glory of God and the disciples catch a glimpse of who he truly is. And as we reflect on this moment, and particularly on Peter's response, I'd like to think about boxes.

Because Peter, as soon as he's witnessed this moment, tries to capture it. He says to Jesus: 'let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' He wants to contain and preserve this mountaintop moment. And I think we do the same. We discover something of God – some experience, some moment of revelation, some glimpse of his beauty – and we try to contain it. We put it in a box. Whether that's a small private box that we keep safe in our hearts, or a big stone box where we come together with friends. We try to contain and confine the experience of God.

But at the heart of the Transfiguration is something that can't be contained. It's not static and unchanging, it's not limited to the dwellings that we make, however lovely they may be. Instead we hear that as Jesus is transfigured and he speaks with Moses and Elijah they 'were speaking of his departure [lit. Exodus], which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem.' At the heart of the Transfiguration is the road to the cross. It stops at the mountaintop, but it will return to valley where Jesus will face his trial and death.

So perhaps the mistake that Peter makes is that he tries to pin down a stationary experience of God, when he should be walking with Jesus on a pilgrimage to the cross. He tries to make a monument on the mountain-top of faith, when he should be walking in the dust of the path to life. He tries to put God in a box, when he should be following him on the road. Perhaps this morning we might try to do the same. To discover the God who can't be contained in a box, but who's glory is shown on the road to the cross.

## 2 Peter 1.16-19

We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain.

So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts.

## Luke 9.28-36

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah', not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.
