Sunday 13th November 2022 Remembrance Sunday

This Remembrance Sunday, particularly in a year that has seen war break out on European soil, I'd like to ask what it means to remember. And our readings offer us a shape to that remembering that looks to a past act, from a transformed present, for a future hope.

So we remember a past act. On Remembrance Sunday, we remember all those who have given their lives on the battlefields of war. Whether those wars are long past or ongoing, we take the time to honour the sacrifice of men and women fallen in war. So we remember with gratitude, but also with clear eyed lament at the tragedy of war. We remember the human cost of conflict, for soldiers and for civilians; for men, women and children. We remember because to forget dooms us to repeat the same horrors.

Then we remember from a transformed present. In our act of remembering we aim to shape a society here and now that will never glorify war again; that will never willingly send men and women to die; that will hold every decision of force in the memory of its cost. With war on our doorstep in Ukraine, all the more we remember the cost of conflict. We remember in order to be a nation that could never choose the path of aggression that leads to such immense loss.

Finally we remember for the sake of a future hope. We remember because we long for a day when war is no more. We remember with prayer, and the commitment to work and live for peace.

This act of remembering, looking to a past act, from a transformed present, for a future hope, is at the heart of our Christian faith. We remember each week the story of a past act of sacrifice, as Jesus gave his life on the cross for our sake. We remember from a transformed present: re-membered, healed, held and changed by this act of remembering. And we remember looking for a future hope in God's promise of a world that will one day forget the ways of war. A world where 'they will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain.'

As we remember today, we remember in hope because in God our past, our present and our future are defined not by the horrors and tragedy of war, but by the hope of redemption in a God who gave his life, that we might live. May we live out that hope, re-membered in Christ.

Isaiah 11.1-9

A shoot shall come out from the stock of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. The spirit of the LORD shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD. His delight shall be in the fear of the LORD. He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear; but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth. and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked. Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins. The wolf shall live with the lamb. the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them. The cow and the bear shall araze. their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den. They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain; for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the LORD as the waters cover the sea.

Luke 22.14-20

When the hour came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfillment in the kingdom of God."

After taking the cup, he gave thanks and said, "Take this and divide it among you. For I tell you I will not drink again from the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes."

And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you."
