Sunday 18th December 2022 Fourth Sunday of Advent

This fourth Sunday of Advent brings us to the final furlong before the big day arrives! As we anticipate Jesus birth this week, we're asked to remember Mary, but as we hear Matthew's account of the announcement of a child to be born, Mary seems to have only a bit part. The story, unlike in Luke's gospel, is told through Joseph's eyes. But as we listen to Matthew's characteristic slant, I think we hear something of both the humanity and the divinity of Jesus.

So first, as we hear of Joseph's part in Jesus' birth, we hear that Jesus is the Son of David, fully human. Just before this Sunday's passage in chapter 1, Matthew begins his Gospel with a lineage of Jesus. He traces his ancestry back to David, and before him to Abraham. But he traces it through Joseph's family tree. That's reinforced in this passage as the angel addresses Joseph also as 'Son of David'. Jesus, in Joseph, is born into the line of those through whom God had once acted to save, and in whom now it is promised that 'he will save his people from their sins.' Jesus enters into the world as part of this human story; part of the work of God through flesh and blood; through the calling of men and women to follow and serve him in the world. Jesus enters the world as fully human, to be part of our story, just as David, and Abraham were before him. As we remember this moment of God's entry into history as the Son of David, perhaps we're asked to remember his work in our lives. God continues to call those who will follow and serve him. How will you respond to that call?

But also, through Mary, we hear that Jesus is born as the Son of God, fully divine. Matthew, as he often does, highlights the way Jesus fulfils the prophecies of Scripture. In his birth, he looks to the child who will be called 'Emmanuel', which means 'God with us.' Jesus is that child, conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of Mary, fully human but also fully divine. Jesus enters into the human story as one of us, but also uniquely as the Son of God. This moment is the moment God chose to touch history not just with the word of his call, or the power of his Spirit, but with the gift of his Son. As we look to the celebrations of Christmas, this is the gift we hold on to. That God's desire is not to leave us alone; not to remain aloof from our lives and our history, but to be God with us. To enter fully into the story of humanity, as the Christ comes to save his people. Fully human, and fully divine. Truly, God with us.

Isaiah 7.10-16

The LORD spoke to Ahaz, saying, Ask a sign of the LORD your God; let it be deep as Sheol or high as heaven. But Ahaz said, I will not ask, and I will not put the LORD to the test. Then Isaiah said: 'Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for you to weary mortals, that you weary my God also? Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel. He shall eat curds and honey by the time he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good. For before the child knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good, the land before whose two kings you are in dread will be deserted.

Matthew 1.18-25

The birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.' All this took place to fulfil what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

'Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel',

which means, 'God is with us.' When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.
