

Team Parish of Christ the King St Aidan's, Brunton Park Sunday 6th August 2023 Transfiguration

The feast of the Transfiguration marks a moment in Jesus' life where the mystery of who he truly is shines, even if only for a few short minutes, into the world. As Jesus is Transfigured before the disciples eyes, they're not seeing something new. They're simply seeing something that has been there all along, they just couldn't see it. In a brief moment of revelation they see a glimpse of the fulness of heaven's glory, but in reality nothing about Jesus changes in the Transfiguration. The only thing that changes is that the disciples can see the truth of who he is.

And I wonder if the same is true of us, and the way we see our world. Do we see material reality, and assume that's all there is? Or do we, from time to time, see the light of heaven shining through it? Do we see another, brighter reality waiting to break into our sightline? Because at heart, that is the task of the spiritual life: to see heaven, even while we live on earth. To know that our eyes alone aren't enough to tell us the truth about our world. To look, and listen, for the light of the transfigured Christ shining into our world, and know that that light, and not just the surface vision, is the truth about reality.

But if the Transfiguration asks us to look for a spiritual reality, it also tells us about the importance of our material reality. Peter famously asks to build three shelters, and stay on that mountaintop: 'It is good for us to be here' he says. But not long after the cloud lifts, the voice of God is only an echo, the light fades, and it's just ordinary Jesus again.

We might want more than anything to stay on the mountaintop, in those moments when it all makes sense. We might want some escape from the grit and grime of our everyday world, into a more beautiful place. But the Transfiguration reminds us that the light of heaven was poured into human form, precisely so that this material reality could be made holy. Even with the grit and the grime. It reminds us that every part of our lives, however day-to-day, is sacred. Every path we tread, and every person we meet, holds some part of this divine reality that Jesus revealed in shining light. So perhaps today the Transfiguration might remind us that, whether we're on the mountaintop, or down in the grit and the grime, the light of heaven is still, and forever, poured into our world to make it holy.

Daniel 7.9-10, 13-14

As I watched. thrones were set in place, and an Ancient One took his throne: his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames, and its wheels were burning fire. A stream of fire issued and flowed out from his presence. A thousand thousand served him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him. The court sat in judgement, and the books were opened. As I watched in the night visions, I saw one like a human beina coming with the clouds of heaven. And he came to the Ancient One and was presented before him. To him was given dominion and glory and kingship, that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not pass away, and his kingship is one that shall never be destroyed.

Luke 9.28-36

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' Peter did not know what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.
