Sunday 24thAugust 2025 St Bartholomew's Day

What does human life in the world look like when lived by a Christian? What does it look like when lived by the collection of Christians called 'Church'? And what does leadership look like in that body?

These are all questions raised on this feast of St Bartholomew the Apostle, and we can begin to find answers in today's readings that describe greatness through service, growth through faithfulness and graciousness in our dealings with others.

Today's feast helps us to draw from the roots of the Church that is preached by Jesus Christ as the way to life in the Father's presence and that is anointed by the life-giving Spirit of God at Pentecost, at which Bartholomew was present.

1 Corinthians 4:9-15

For I think that God has exhibited us apostles as last of all, as though sentenced to death, because we have become a spectacle to the world, to angels and to mortals. We are fools for the sake of Christ, but you are wise in Christ. We are weak, but you are strong. You are held in honour, but we in disrepute. To the present hour we are hungry and thirsty, we are poorly clothed and beaten and homeless, and we grow weary from the work of our own hands. When reviled, we bless; when persecuted, we endure; when slandered, we speak kindly. We have become like the rubbish of the world, the dregs of all things, to this very day.

I am not writing this to make you ashamed, but to admonish you as my beloved children. For though you might have ten thousand guardians in Christ, you do not have many fathers. Indeed, in Christ Jesus I became your father through the gospel

Luke 22: 24-30

A dispute also arose among them as to which one of them was to be regarded as the greatest. But he said to them, 'The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them; and those in authority over them are called benefactors. But not so with you; rather the greatest among you must become like the youngest, and the leader like one who serves. For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one at the table? But I am among you as one who serves. 'You are those who have stood by me in my trials; and I confer on you, just as my Father has conferred on me, a kingdom, so that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom, and you will sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel.

OPEN DCC MEETING AND DISCUSSION – Following a request from the congregation to display some visible support for Pride next year (a poster, banner, or similar) the DCC has decided to host an open meeting. This isn't a decision St Aidan's has taken so far, and we want a good process to reach a consensus. A couple of dates for your diary are: Wednesday 10th September, 7.30pm, Rev'd Emma Duff, Newcastle Dioceses' LGBT+ Chaplin, will host an evening at St Aidan's with input and discussion on the wider questions the church faces, and the experience of LGBT+ people in the church. Wednesday 25th Sept, the DCC will hold an open discussion which all are welcome to attend, on how we want to respond.

CHRISTIAN AID -GAZA - Following enquiries by some as to what we can do in response to the situation in Gaza. Helen Cunningham from Christian Aid has suggested, donations to the Middle East Appeal, as apparently Christian Aid is supporting partners who are able to do some good despite restrictions there. The 'Fast for Gaza' campaign that encourages people to fast once a week, to sign up on the website to let Christian Aid know that they are joining, and also if they want to, to contact their MP as a lot of people may not be able to fast.
