Sunday 21st September 2025 Trinity 14. St Matthew

The parable set for this Sunday is among the most confusing Jesus tells. A dishonest manager seems to swindle his master, and yet is praised for his underhand dealings, before Jesus goes on to say: 'you cannot serve God and wealth.' It's hard to wrap this parable into a neat moral message, but perhaps that's the point. In a complex world of mixed motives, perhaps this parable reminds Christians to keep both their eyes and their hearts open.

Christians need open eyes to the realities of a fallen world. Sin is very much a part of how life works, and our own motives, just as those of others, are often a mix of self-interest and self-giving. As Christians we shouldn't be surprised that people are dishonest, that life isn't fair, that sometimes the bad-guy wins. We need open eyes to this reality, because Jesus surely knew the full power of sin, and came to save us from it.

But we also need open hearts. In the midst of a complex, fallen world, there are still always signs of grace. The dishonest manager forgives a debt and is restored. Even in mixed motives, God is at work, and Christians are called to have hearts that are open to God's work of grace even in the most unlikely of places. So with open eyes, and open hearts we face a fallen world, and yet proclaim the grace we have received in Christ, who forgave our debts on the cross, and grants all who trust in him the true riches of God's Kingdom.

Jeremiah 8.18-9.1

My joy is gone; grief is upon me;

my heart is sick.

Listen! The cry of the daughter of my people

from far and wide in the land:

"Is the LORD not in Zion?

Is her King not in her?"

("Why have they provoked me to anger with their images,

with their foreign idols?")

"The harvest is past, the summer is ended,

and we are not saved."

For the brokenness of the daughter of my people I am broken,

I mourn, and horror has seized me.

Is there no balm in Gilead?

Is there no physician there?

Why then has the health of the daughter of my people not been restored?

O that my head were a spring of water and my eyes a fountain of tears, so that I might weep day and night for the slain of the daughter of my people!

Luke 16.1-13

Then Jesus said to the disciples, 'There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, "What is this that I hear about you? Give me an account of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer." Then the manager said to himself, "What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes." So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, "How much do you owe my master?" He answered, "A hundred jugs of olive oil." He said to him, "Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty." Then he asked another, "And how much do you owe?" He replied, "A hundred containers of wheat." He said to him, "Take your bill and make it eighty." And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

'Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth.'
