Sunday 12th October 2025 Trinity 17

This week's Gospel reading continues the theme of gratitude. Last week we celebrated Harvest festival, a chance to give thanks to God, and this week we're reminded again of the importance of gratefulness. So why is it worth hammering home the point? I'm sure we all learned our Ps and Qs as children, so why is saying thank you that important? Well the reason, I think, is that true gratitude changes how we live, and true gratitude is not all that easy.

So 10 lepers are healed, but 9 of them simply leave without a word of thanks to God. So often we can be like this. Things go right, and instead of thanking God we take them for granted. Our healing isn't a gift but a right, our possessions aren't a blessing from God, but things that are ours to claim. But one leper returned to give thanks to God. And what a difference it could make it we could do the same. If we could turn all that we have, all that we're given, into opportunities to thank God. Not because we deserve these things, not because we have any right to hold onto them, but because God has been generous, and we respond with thanks. What difference would it make to your life if you could be more like that one leper who, astounded by the goodness of God's grace, returned and gave him thanks for what he had received?

Jeremiah 29, 1, 4-7

These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people, whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon. It said: Thus says the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

Luke 17, 11-19

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!' When he saw them, he said to them, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, 'Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?' Then he said to him, 'Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well.'
