

The Team Parish of Christ the King St Aidan's Church Brunton Park Sunday 19th October 2025 Trinity 18

The passage below from Genesis is one that I've always loved, as it tells the story of how Israel got his name. Jacob, the father of the twelve sons who would become the twelve tribes of Israel, is making his journey back to his homeland and his brother Esau (there's a whole other story to be told there!). On the journey we're told of this strange encounter as Jacob meets an angel. He's not named explicitly as an angel – as is the case in many similar encounters in the Bible – but this is a man of whom Jacob later says: 'I have seen God face to face'. So, Jacob wrestles this mysterious figure to try to wrest a blessing from him and in the process he gains a new name: 'Israel'.

This is the name of the people of God, the nation that God chooses to become his witnesses in the world, and one way of translating that name, as this story suggests is: 'wrestles with God'. At the heart of the identity of the people God chooses isn't docile obedience, or flawless unquestioning faith, but a people who wrestle with God. So if you've ever had a bone to pick with God; if your faith has ever struggled to make sense of things; if you've ever shouted your prayers instead of meekly offering them, then you're in good company. Much of the history of God's people, and the prayers of the Bible (especially the Psalms) is exactly this kind of faith. A faith that wrestles with a God. I, for one, find that of immense comfort!

Genesis 32. 22-31

The same night he got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. Then he said, 'Let me go, for the day is breaking.' But Jacob said, 'I will not let you go, unless you bless me.' So he said to him, 'What is your name?' And he said, 'Jacob.' Then the man said, 'You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans and have prevailed.' ²⁹ Then Jacob asked him, 'Please tell me your name.' But he said, 'Why is it that you ask my name?' And there he blessed him. So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, 'For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved.' The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

Luke 18. 1-8

Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. He said, 'In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, "Grant me justice against my opponent." For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, "Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming." And the Lord said, 'Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?
